Dreamers, Schemers, Bigots and Rogues, oh my!

We have another terrific speaker for our upcoming **General Meeting on Monday, October 13 at 7:30 pm.** Gary Noy, a Sierra Nevada native and resident, and history professor at Sierra Community College in Rocklin, is the author of **"Sierra Stories: Tales of Dreamers, Schemers, Bigots and Rogues."** Born in Grass Valley and a graduate of UC Berkeley and CSU Sacramento, Gary is the author of many newspaper columns and magazine articles on Sierra Nevada history and culture.

Gary will present an illustrated lecture on unusual and lesser known stories of Sierra Nevada history, with a special focus on the Santa Clara Valley. The presentation is based upon material from his latest book, **"Sierra Stories"** which will be available for sale and signing after his presentation. A highlight of his presentation will be the telling of tales of six 19 century painters and photographers who popularized Yosemite Valley. All of these artists had connections to the San Francisco Bay Area and especially to the Santa Clara Valley.

President's Letter



I have had the privilege of bring your President for a little over a year and I am still amazed at how this vibrant organization functions. I was on the Board during the time of the

Centennial celebration and was partly involved in the planning of the Author's Day last summer, but for the first time this summer I got to see a great event from the spark of an idea to a rip-roaring success. I am talking, of course, about the Antique Appraisal Faire which took place on August 24.

At a Board meeting last September or October, board member and gift shop director, **Margaret Lawson** quietly mentioned that she had attended an event in Walnut Creek where Michaan's Auction house in Oakland had provided some appraisers and conducted an event similar to the Antique Road Show which we all watch on Public Television. Everyone said, "That's nice Margaret," and we went on to the next agenda item. A month later, she said it louder and by the third month, museum director **Laura Babcock**, who likes to plan a major event each summer, perked up and said, "We should do that next summer." An idea was born and eight months of planning and preparation had begun.

Laura took the lead and **Jeanine Stanek**, museum archivist, filled in the blanks behind the scenes, as she always does, and the project was underway. Michaan's was contacted and a date set. The city permits were secured and we began to see a general layout for the event. Appraisers in many disciplines would be provided from jewelry to artwork and from furniture to toys and coins. It was decided that we should have pre-paid appointments for our customers so Laura and Jeanine, and many others in the gift shop, set up a scheduling system and took reservations for more than 500 time slots in the four hour event. Next came **Larry Klein**, past

president, who created a flyer for the event and interfaced with two advertising agencies meeting deadlines and approving copy.

About halfway into the planning, it was decided this would be an excellent opportunity to raise some money for the museum and clear out our storage space by selling some of the antiques that had been donated to the museum. These items could never be displayed in a way that would show off their real beauty. An antique sale was born. These items were expertly priced by volunteer **Janice Havey**. The ever-reliable and hardworking **Rosa Romano** recruited volunteers. Board member **Marie Kuykendall** provided refreshments for the day, as well as the ubiquitous **Rotary Interactors** who provided the labor to set up and tear down. This project was also joined by the **LDS Elders and Sisters** who are always around to help out. The usual suspects, **Zita Melton, Monte Stamper, Don Adams, Kathy Chan** and **Sherveen Deuskar** pitched in to make and place required signs. Lastly, more than 30 volunteers worked all day welcoming, guiding, cleaning up and doing all the things to make our guests feel important. I'm sure I have left someone out and for that I apologize.

The day itself went just tremendously. Michaan's reported they had never seen an event where every time slot was sold in advance. The gift shop was full of people all day. The pre-arranged appointments controlled the crowds so no one had to wait a long time and there were always a comfortable number of people in the museum. We raised some money and exposed scores of new people to our location and activities. Once again, our crack team of devoted volunteers worked together and created an event that was truly classy. This place is amazing!

I am hoping that you were able to attend and enjoyed it as much as I did. Perhaps it prompted you to bring another person who might wish to become a museum member. Perhaps it reminded you that there are many different ways to volunteer at the museum. Oh, I almost forgot! My wife, **Janet**, and I also contributed by inflating the helium-filled balloons that festooned the signs guiding people to the event from Manet and Michelangelo Drive.


